

Congregation Meeting - Elders Report June 25, 2023 Mt. Hope Lutheran Church-LCMS

Mt. Hope and Trinity Lutheran Churches Dual Parish continue to be blessed to have Pastor Ken Bernthal and Pastor Paul Schneider serving us during our pastoral vacancy. The Dual Parish Board with a joint meeting of both Elder Boards in discussions with Pastor Bernthal and Pastor Schneider decided to have Pastor Bernthal conduct all services at both churches; he continues to decline any salary or mileage remuneration. Pastor Schneider will serve as the Administrative Pastor for both churches for which he receives a salary. As the administrative pastor, he organizes the bulletin for the Scripture readings and selects the hymns for the services each week, overseeing the work of the secretaries at both churches as well as attending the Elder Board meetings and advising the Elder Boards. The secretary at Trinity compiles the bulletin using the LSB program. Mt. Hope shares the cost of that work with Trinity.

At Mt. Hope he has organized and revised Nicole Alma's work schedule tasks – these include updating the members' records on our Shepherd Staff records software program. This included working with Council to obtain photos of all members since the ones for the newer members hadn't been obtained. He also has used the program to revise and include our Elders' Member Assignment list. He has our secretary update weekly the Bulletin listings of those serving weekly, those on the Prayer List and list the Bible readings for the next service. We now have one up-to-date email contact list for Mt. Hope for use by the Chairman, the Council, the Elders, the secretary, and the Prayer Chain. Pastor Paul now has an up-to-date shut-in list and is contacting those members.

We continue to record our services with our recording equipment - video camera, sound board system (overhead mikes, lapel mike, handheld mike, piano keyboard) and audio input device - and place the recordings on our web page via YouTube for subsequent viewing by members and others. Our audio input device (the little red box by Focusrite) had not been recording the input from the sound board, only the two overhead mikes. It was the warranty replacement of the first input device and configured differently. Jim Heinlein determined that only two of the input ports on it were being fed into the recording program. The maker of the input device, Focusrite, said we need to download a routine that will let us enable the other two input ports on the back side to function in the recording program so that we can input three sources (two overhead mikes and sound board). Tyler at Classic Computers who has the technical skills came and enabled the two input ports on the back of the Focusrite audio input device so we can record all audio sources for our services.

In discussions with Northern Pines Nursing Home, they expressed interest in seeing the recordings of our church services. With our recording issues solved enabling good sound recording we will reach out to them.

Having received many requests, we returned to serving Communion at the Altar. We have not yet decided to return to using the Common Cup during Communion. We have also reinstituted attendance cards and prayer requests being collected during service. Elders will again give prayer requests to the pastor if individuals put them on the attendance cards or request the elder on duty to bring them forward. We urge members to fill them out. We collect them during the first hymn as the elder on duty is busy with ongoing recording operations throughout the service, making that the best and most logical time to do so.

We were saddened by the unexpected passing of Mike Nowak. For years he has overseen and recruited greeters and ushers. We are need of a member to take on and provide this role for the good order of our services. We also removed the 2nd pew from the back on the left side to facilitate an aisle way to eliminate the bottleneck at the soundboard and recording station. This was Discussed with Trustee Mike Shields presented to and approved by Council.

We held Advent Services – Nov 30, Dec 7, 14, 21 with mid-week devotions and snacks afterward; Frank Moore searched for and acquired Advent material that members could follow. We planned and held Lenten services for only Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. David Paul Britton was scheduled to hold a musical worship service for the June 18th service for both D-P congregations.

We prepared the Elders Budget for FY 2023-2024 and submitted it to Council. We increased it by about 5% to reflect the current inflation rate. We gave appropriate annual raises to our secretary, bookkeeper and pianist. Our pianist lives in Grayling and has declined any mileage remuneration.

We discussed the need for a larger TV for the Fellowship Hall to make it easier to read. Steve Koch donated an 86inch flat screen smart TV to Mt. Hope. It is used for Bible Studies and Movie Night. The 55-inch TV was moved to the Sunday School Room. The Trustees evaluated the viability of and had the electronic sign serviced and enabled to be accessed via a Bluetooth link. Jim Heinlein got the laptop that is used to posts the messages updated for using a new Wi-Fi link. Backup training for a second person that can update sign messages was held.

We have discussed our needs for marketing, outreach and administration needs, but this is partly dependent of our calling a pastor. We don't think that this can be done by member volunteers and is in addition to the time given in the serving Mt. Hope by a Dual Parish pastor. Our goal is that it should be a separate part-time staff position.

We recommended to Council that they appoint a separate committee that would review our By-Laws for expanding responsibilities and explanations.

We discussed having our Stephen fund be enhanced by more specific procedures to more easily enable helping urgent requests for help and aid by individuals contacting our church and clarify who has authority to provide assistance.

We have had the services of A.J. Stansil, a gifted pianist and musician, for a whole year.

Mitch Lindahl keeps our Facebook page up to date.

At our July 2022 meeting Jack Owens was elected to serve as Chair for the Elder Board. Jeff Pregler was elected as Chairman of the Congregation while still continuing to serve as an Elder. Dave Jansen was appointed by the Council to fulfill Steve Koch's term as Treasurer; he continues to serve as an Elder. The Elder Board appointed Mike Shields to replace Steve Koch as an Elder after Steve's passing; we are thankful for his long service and that Mike accepted fulfilling our need for a sixth Elder.

Rev. Chuck and Karen Tessaro first set foot in Nigeria, where there are over 500 different language groups, in 1985. They serve with multiple local translation teams including the Old Testament teams for the Ikwerre, Yala, Kukele and Gokana languages. These teams also promote literacy and serve in their local community as teachers and helpers.

The Tessaros met and married at Concordia College, Ann Arbor, Michigan. By the time Chuck had graduated from Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN, their family had grown to four. Called to serve on a translation team in Nigeria, the Tessaros spent a year at the Summer Institute of Linguistics in Texas before heading for Africa. Since finishing the Eleme New Testament in 2002 and assisting with the consultant checking of the Ikwerre New Testament in 2010, Chuck and Karen are principally responsible for mentoring LBT's International Associates in Nigeria and training and consulting with various Old Testament translation teams.

Go and Wash Feet

During the last meal Jesus had with His disciples, the very eve of His betrayal and crucifixion, He knelt to *"wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was wrapped around Him"* (John 13:5). Four Fathers: Luther on Authority and the Fourth Commandment

A Twitter user asked The Lutheran Witness:

Why does Luther define the categories of fatherhood in the Large Catechism (4th Commandment): by blood

of a household

of a nation?

This Tweet got me thinking about the ways that Luther speaks of fatherhood. Luther, in fact, discusses four kinds of "fathers" in the Large Catechism, in his explanation of the Fourth Commandment:

So we have introduced three kinds of fathers in this commandment: fathers by blood, fathers of a household, and fathers of the nation. In addition, there are also spiritual fathers — not like those in the papacy who have had themselves called "father" but have not performed a fatherly function. For the name of spiritual father belongs only to those who govern and guide us by the Word of God.

(LC I 158, KW)

Luther's language

By "father by blood" Luther speaks of a parent, the natural father, dad.

To understand "father of a household" we remember that until very recently the "home" included a number of workers. Many families and individuals would work together in a household: working in the fields, in the kitchen, helping with the children's education, accounting, cleaning and so forth. Imagine a farm where the home is also the business. In this arrangement, the patriarch is the "father" of more than his own children; he also has responsibility for all those who work in the homestead.

Luther extends this office and responsibility also to the nation. Brilliantly, Luther understands all authority to extend from the office of parent. "Furthermore, in connection with this commandment, we must mention the sort of obedience due to superiors, persons whose duty it is to command and to govern. For all other authority is derived and developed out of the authority of parents" (LC I 141, KW). Rulers, then, are "fathers of the nation."

They are all called fathers in the Scriptures because in their sphere of authority they have been commissioned as fathers and ought to have fatherly hearts toward their people. Thus from ancient times the Romans and peoples speaking other languages called the masters and mistresses of the household patres et matres familias, that is, housefathers and housemothers.

(LC I 142, KW)

Luther also recognizes pastors as "spiritual fathers," those who govern and guide the Lord's church with the Word of God.

In short, Luther understands any authority or "headship" to be connected with fatherhood.

And other authorities

Beyond this, the Twitter user asked, "Why?" I think this question could be taken in two different ways: "Why does Luther extend the Fourth Commandment beyond the natural family into human government?" or "Why does Luther see fatherhood in these different ways?" Both are good questions to consider.

First, many people are surprised by the "and other authorities" in Luther's explanation of the Fourth Commandment.

Honor your father and your mother. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, $\frac{10}{10}$ serve and obey them, love and cherish them.

(SC I, The Fourth Commandment, emphasis added)

Isn't God just telling us how to treat mom and dad? How did my teacher and the police officer get into the commandment? Luther explains in the Large Catechism that the teacher and the policeman, the judge and the governor, are all there to help and serve mom and dad in raising the children. "Where a father is unable by himself to bring up his child, he calls upon a schoolmaster to teach him; if he is too weak, he seeks the help of his friends and neighbors; if he dies, he confers and delegates his responsibility and authority to others appointed for the purpose" (LC I 141). All temporal authority, as Luther understands it, is to protect, bless and serve the children. The children live under this authority.

Luther's division of fatherhood into blood, household, nation and church echo his understanding of the "three estates": the family, the church and the state. These three estates shape the way Luther sees and understands the world.

In 1528 Luther wrote, "But the holy orders and true religious institutions established by God are these three: the office of priest, the estate of marriage, the civil government" (LW 37:364). These same categories are recorded in Luther's Table Talks: "The Bible speaks and teaches about the works of God. About this there is no doubt. These works are divided in three hierarchies: the household, the government, the church" (LW 54:446). <u>Throughout his writings</u>, Luther continued to teach about <u>these three estates</u>.

The three estates form a framework for Luther's thinking, and when applied to fatherhood in the explanation of the Fourth Commandment, the father of the house, the nation and the church are all expounded.

Who Is My Neighbor?

Love: self-giving, self-effacing, scary. Our journey to love is tortuous. Parents, siblings, friends, spouse, children—all calling us to more self-giving, more forgiving, more painful introspecting. As Christian women, we are frequently driven to ask this question: "Who is my neighbor?"

Who do we protect as our own? Who should be protected and included in our circle of belonging? As Christians, our circle includes all human beings. Why? Because all human beings, by the very fact that they exist, bear the image of God. The image of God isn't like clothes that are put over our body. It isn't like intelligence, which varies from person to person. Scripture teaches us that every living human being bears the image of God simply by the fact that they are a living human being. Period. Even the tiniest. So for a Christian, the terms "human being" and "human person" are describing the same thing.

But we live in a culture now which is at war with God. Our culture wants to include some human beings in the circle of belonging and call only those human beings "persons." Our culture wants to push other human beings outside this circle of protection and call them "non-persons." Exclusion from the circle allows the excluded human beings to be treated as property rather than persons.

How we view our fellow human beings, whether as persons or as property, determines what we are okay with doing to them. **Embryo research, elective abortion, infanticide, euthanasia, and slavery all have two very important things in common:** 1. They all have been or currently are legal in the USA and, 2. They all assume that there are human beings who should be excluded from society's circle of protection and treated as property.

And unfortunately, that is the position most comfortable to our fallen human nature. Dehumanizing our neighbors allows us to do terrible things to them and then not feel remorse or guilt for what we have done. How do we manage this psychological gymnastic and still feel good about ourselves? We change the language! We call human beings we want to protect "persons" and those we don't want to protect "non-persons" (and other things) so that we can treat them as property.

A few years ago, I was writing an amicus brief on a legal case which would decide the fate of human embryos who were being stored in the deep freeze while the mother and father divorced. One spouse wanted them to be implanted in a caring mother's womb and given a chance to thrive. The other spouse wanted them destroyed to avoid the responsibility of being a parent. In the amicus, I argued that scientifically these embryos are undeniably tiny human beings, and their custody should be decided according to family law, which considers what is in the best interest of the children. The other side argued that the tiny human beings are just property and the fate of these living human beings should be decided under property law, which would mean that they should be destroyed.

As Christians we are called to include all human beings in our circle of protection. As Christian women, we are especially called to embrace our children as gifts.

As women, we have been given an incredible gift of being the indispensable link between the past and the future of the human race. That is pretty awesome. A woman who nourishes her tiny neighbor in her womb is beautiful, especially in God's eyes.

But sometimes finding out that you are carrying a baby in your womb doesn't feel like a gift at all. Doesn't God understand how hard it is to do what I want to do if I am required to take care of this human being for 20 years or even for eight months?

The answer is "Yes, He does."

And that is one reason I love the story of the Good Samaritan. I really doubt that the Good Samaritan was on some kind of an emotional or spiritual high when he was pulling his donkey along the mountainous road from Jerusalem to Jericho. I have been to Jerusalem, and I have driven up and down that tortuous mountain road. When the Samaritan picked up his very inconvenient neighbor, it is very likely that he still had a long journey to go to get to Jericho. And now, he would have to walk it. Because someone else was slumped over his donkey. I'll bet he was tempted many times to dump the guy off and get back on his own donkey and ride. What many other people would have done, he didn't do. God had made him see the human being who needed him, who would die without his help. That is real love.

I can finally perceive that God put some of the most difficult neighbors in my life at some of the most difficult times in order to bring me to the end of myself. Jesus didn't say that what God asks us to do would be easy. What God asks is impossibly difficult if God were not actually alongside us, helping us every step of the way. But the good news is that He is alongside us, helping us every step of the way. And His real, tangible love transforms us in ways we can't even imagine, into someone beautiful. That is why we love, because He first loves us.

1,200 Crosses

Arms full, Bulldogs 4 Life members walked to the center of the Concordia University Nebraska campus carrying 1,200 crosses to be placed along the walkways. Nebraska Lutherans For Life sponsored this moving display where each cross represented two of the approximately 2,800 babies lost to abortion in the United States each day. The display spurred questions about the effects of abortion and gave a visual representation of the sheer number of lives lost.

A gasp was heard when one of the campus custodians saw the display for the first time and read the sign that accompanied it. She pulled out her phone and started filming while walking around the quad in awe.

One of the Bulldogs 4 Life members commented on the impact picking up the crosses had on her. She counted each cross as she stacked them in her arms. One. Two. Three. Four. Five. Ten. Twenty. Thirty-Five. She was holding 70 babies in her arms. It made her feel sick to her stomach.

This simple display left a lasting impression on the members of the club who are active in the fight for life, as well as those of the general Concordia University Nebraska community. **How to Honor a Life**

"Do not cast me off in the time of old age; forsake me not when my strength is spent" (Psalm 71:9)

Communion comes once a month at my church, and there is a moment during each of these services that stops my breath. After everyone in the pews has come forward, received the Body and Blood, and sat back down, the pastor makes his way to the very back where Albert sits and patiently waits.

This man, 95 years old and no longer able to get himself to church, to his pew, or even to the bathroom alone, served our church and community with his hands, heart, and mind for seven decades. A German immigrant, he survived the wreckage of WWII, even hiding out in barns near the end to escape notice. He built a life here and is known to my children as the one who used to hand out Twizzlers to them after Sunday school. He has helped care for the property, the building, and the people inside it for more than twice the time that I've been alive. Now that he can no longer do those things, what is to be done with him? There are some who would have you believe that his is a useless life now, a burden on himself and on others and that, for the good of everybody, we should release it—or, at least, look the other way as his candle snuffs out.

The Church offers a different take, one that is on display in that moment during every communion service when the pastor heads to the back row. There is no fanfare, no announcement saying, "Now it's Albert's turn." (I'm not even sure it's appropriate for me to turn my head and look, but I can never help my-self.) As the pastor quietly gives, and Albert quietly takes, I'm always struck by the beauty of this simple moment between men who love each other—the one in the prime of his life bestowing the greatest gift in the universe to the one whose only duty now is to receive.

In that moment, when the script is flipped, when the old receives from the young, when the young offers to the old, when the Savior touches down and unites them both, is the Church.




