

A Lectio Divina of Psalm 41

Lectio divina means "divine or heavenly reading." This devotional practice has a long history among Christians. It involves not just scanning and understanding the words on Scripture's pages but also contemplating and praying them. Lectio divina recalls the familiar petition that our Lord grant us to "read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest" His Word. This draws us into a sacred conversation with our God who both speaks and listens. Martin Luther offered a unique adaptation of lectio divina to a dear friend when instructing how to "pray" the Small Catechism. He suggested taking each portion as a teaching, then as a thanksgiving, then as a confession, and then as a request. Our 2022 national conference and 2023 Life Sunday theme—Blessed For Life, from Psalm 41—offers an opportunity for us to engage the benefits of lectio divina.

Psalm 41:1a: Blessed is the one who considers the poor!

O Lord, Heavenly Father, almighty and everlasting God, You teach us that You remember, visit, and relieve us and our neighbors in our needs and sufferings. You draw near in Jesus Christ and invite us to receive others as gifts and privileges by sharing in their circumstances. For Jesus' sake, accept our humble and hearty thanks that You involve us in community with Yourself and with each other, giving us occasion to belong to and serve persons other than ourselves. We confess that we have despised our poverties as opportunities for Your blessings and have disregarded those whose differences cause us discomfort. Pardon our iniquities and open our eyes to behold You encountering us through the least of these, especially in their hours of crisis and moments of vulnerability; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Psalm 41:1b-3: In the day of trouble the Lord delivers him; the Lord protects him and keeps him alive; he is called blessed in the land; you do not give him up to the will of his enemies. The Lord sustains him on his sickbed; in his illness you restore him to full health.

Mighty Deliverer, You teach us that Your relentless grace and gentle mercy protect and provide for even the weakest among us in every danger and adversity from fertilization to forever. Let us thank and praise Your name for so honoring us in the sight of all the forces and agents of evil, especially as You have granted healing from every injury and illness. Forgive us for doubting and despairing of Your power to save and sustain and for reckoning disease or affliction as indication of displeasure on Your part. Lead us to seek health and not death, caring and not killing, for our neighbors' ailments and our own, with sure trust in Your authority over all our days; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Psalm 41:4: As for me, I said, "O Lord, be gracious to me; heal me, for I have sinned against you!"

Holy Father, You teach us that our common human condition of sinfulness causes all pain and dying, and if not for Your patience and grace, we would perish entirely and eternally. Thank You for Your Son's atoning sacrifice that imparts Your forgiveness to not only rescue us from everlasting damnation but also to spare us every temporal calamity that we deserve. We acknowledge our transgression in not reflecting and extending the same grace and compassion to the precious lives around us, even though our Savior has reconciled every member of our race. Grant Your Son's resurrection and redemption to restore wholeness and dignity to us and all whom sin has deprived; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Psalm 41:5-8: My enemies say of me in malice, "When will he die, and his name perish?" And when one comes to see me, he utters empty words, while his heart gathers iniquity; when he goes out, he tells it abroad. All who hate me whisper together about me; they imagine the worst for me. They say, "A deadly thing is poured out on him; he will not rise again from where he lies."

Gracious God, You teach us that death represents the enemy of life, survival, identity, and immortality, and it operates as instrument of the evil one in hardening hearts against Your Gospel. We gratefully celebrate how You continue to befriend and defend those considered disposable by the culture. We also admit our guilt in seeing and treating neighbors of differing ideologies as enemies and wishing or working evil toward them. Inspire us to advocate on behalf of the hearts and lives endangered by abortion, embryocidal experimentation, assisted suicide, and other mindsets and measures that threaten Your dear ones; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Psalm 41:9-10: Even my close friend in whom I trusted, who ate my bread, has lifted his heel against me. But you, O Lord, be gracious to me, and raise me up, that I may repay them!

Dear Jesus, You teach us that Your incarnation as an embryo among us has made our sorrows, sicknesses, and other sufferings Your own. Thanks to You undergoing betrayal, abandonment, crucifixion, punishment, and persecution, we never face these anxieties hopeless or alone. Forgive us for having turned our backs on Your Gospel promises and underserved persons because we fear the difficulties they come with. Preserve us during the agony of interpersonal conflicts that arise from speaking Your truth and

showing Your love, that we remember and rely on Your comforting presence and keep reaching neighbors whom the world isolates, for Your name's sake.

Psalm 41:11-12: By this I know that you delight in me: my enemy will not shout in triumph over me. But you have upheld me because of my integrity, and set me in your presence forever.

Almighty Maker, You create, redeem, and call us and each human life for Your own delight and to dwell in Your presence forever. Thank You for the everlasting assurance that You have subdued our enemies for us and will not permit sin and death to have authority over us. We confess that our integrity and faithfulness wavers because of our selfish hearts and the weakness of our nature, and we regularly give in to and even ally ourselves with pursuits that we ought to avoid. Let us know Your great delight in snatching lives from the jaws of death and upholding them by Your hand; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Psalm 41:13: Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! Amen and amen.

Blessed Lord God, You teach us that the days and destinies of every living thing come and go at Your good pleasure and under Your watchful eye. Thank You for establishing Your Word and Your will as never-ending, effective, and trustworthy. We confess that we have sought stability in the things of men and the ways of this world rather than assenting to Your voice. Bid us rejoice and delight with those around us as brothers and sisters in all the blessings You promise and provide to those who trust the grace and name of Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The Sacrifice

"To [love God] and to love one's neighbor as oneself, is more than all the whole burnt offerings and sacrifices" (Mark 12:33).

Remember the good old Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you"? It's a rule that we like to think we keep as Christians, and keep well. However, when we carefully examine our own thoughts, words, and deeds toward our neighbors—from little neighbors in our homes who keep us from our own agendas to big neighbors in our communities whom we scorn, rather than pity and grieve—we might quickly conclude that a burnt offering and a sacrificial system would be much easier than perfection on this matter of the Golden Rule!

The passage above was asserted by a scribe in response to Jesus summarizing the most important commandment, quoting from Deuteronomy 6:4-5 and Leviticus 19:18. Essentially, Jesus condensed all of the Old Testament into a single phrase, "Love God and love your neighbor." While a goodly bulk of the Old Testament prescribes a sacrificial system we no longer follow in modern times, that system was instituted by God to point believers to Christ, who was to come, and was, in fact, now in their midst. This side of Heaven, we will never perfectly love our neighbors, yet our good God has provided for us, His children. Hebrews 9:13-14 declares, "For if the blood of goats and bulls ... sanctify for the purification of the flesh, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit, offered Himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God." In joy for that purification, may God make us all into sacrificial lovers of our neighbors, small and great, beginning in our homes and overflowing into our communities.

My heart must Thou have solely, My Savior and my God! Come, Jesus, take it wholly, And make it Thine abode! Mold it to Thy control, That I, Thy Word receiving, May find, in Thee believing, Salvation for my soul.

Even in Darkness

It's dark as I write this article, and it will likely be darker still when you read it. The coming of winter means the absence of light, and winter is definitely coming. In southern Indiana, we've felt a chill that's often reserved for weeks, if not months, from now. Winter is at our doorstep; the days are getting shorter and colder as we lean away from the sun.

Despite my love of daylight, I readily admit that darkness and the close of day resonate with good gifts—gifts like the comforts of home and family, freshly bathed children snuggling in for a story, evening devotions and bedtime prayers. Darkness is a gift that gives us the opportunity to rest and reset, a gift that prepares us for a new day and the work to come.

Yet, darkness reminds us of other realities too, of moments that are much less comforting. Perhaps it brings to mind nights spent in fervent prayer over a sick child or elderly loved one. Perhaps it harkens back to restless hours filled with worries and fears, loneliness and nightmares that kept us from the peace we had hoped for.

Darkness often carries with it a negative connotation. This was true in biblical times, and it is still true today. From the idioms and allusions we use in daily conversation to the eerie music playing in the background of movie scenes filmed at night, we know darkness has the potential to bring disorder, destruction, and even death.

And if we've read our Bible, we know that dark days and dark nights are coming. "'You will hear of wars and rumors of wars,' Jesus declares. 'See that you are not alarmed, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are but the beginning of the birth pains. Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and put you to death, and you will be hated by all nations for my name's sake'" (Matthew 24:6-9).

Jesus speaks of dark times to be certain, end times. And we are living in them. Yet, God's Word to us brings comfort and life: "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

Even more reassuring? Romans 8:39 reminds us that nothing can "separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

But what about our own lives? Like the transition into winter, we have dark seasons in our lives too—seasons full of sickness and suffering, periods of difficulty, loss, and grief. Sometimes those seasons befall us through no fault of our own; they are simply the result of sin and suffering in the world. And sometimes these seasons come because we, like the earth itself, are leaning away from the Son.

The Psalmist in Psalm 41 is clearly experiencing a dark season of sickness and suffering. Gravely ill, the Psalmist records the reactions of others: "My enemies say of me in malice, 'When will he die, and his name perish?' ... All who hate me whisper together about me; they imagine the worst for me. They say, 'A deadly thing is poured out on him; he will not rise again from where he lies'" (41:5,7-8).

To make dark matters even worse, it seems his close friend has also betrayed him. (41:9) Yet, despite these dark times, God's Word speaks life and truth. The Psalmist declares his hope as he clings to the light of Christ. "In the day of trouble the Lord delivers him; the Lord protects him and keeps him alive" (41:1b-2a).

How can he declare this truth so boldly? Because he knows that even in darkness, we are blessed For Life.

The devil, the world, and our own sinful flesh are at work to turn us toward the darkness, but we were made for light and life. God's Word and Sacraments cast darkness aside in our lives; they draw us closer to Him and make us strong unto salvation. May we, like the Psalmist, cling to the promises of Christ. May we recognize that we are blessed For Life even when we are surrounded by darkness, and may we in our darkest seasons, through the work of the Holy Spirit, lean toward the Son for light and for hope. "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! Amen and Amen" (Psalm 41:13).

Reminder about inclement weather and church functions: Our policy for bad weather cancellations has been to cancel morning Bible studies, etc. when local schools close. Evening meetings and events will probably continue, as long as road crews are out and a storm is not intensifying. Sunday services, as well as Advent and Lent midweek services, are seldom cancelled. However, do not attempt to drive if your local conditions are poor and you are uncomfortable driving in the weather!
